



Suggested ring (band) internal diameters suitable for South Asian vultures

Introduction

Leg rings (bands) are sometimes used to mark vultures as individuals. Telescope-readable engraved plastic and metal rings are available. Rings have an important advantage over patagial wing tags in that they can be designed to be difficult for the birds to remove and can also have low breakage rates. Patagial wing tags are often lost within a few years of fitting and are therefore problematic to use for long-term studies of survival by mark-resighting analysis. The most reliable rings for long-term marking are probably rivetted alloy rings, which have been used to mark large eagles in Europe for a long period and appear to have low loss rates. Engraved plastic rings can also be used, but the ring overlap should be glued with an appropriate cement to reduce the risk of loss or of the ring opening in hot conditions and trapping the foot. Glued plastic rings may still be lost if the ring fractures. This may occur when the ring strikes an object, especially under cold conditions. The purpose of this note is to suggest appropriate internal diameters for leg rings for South Asian vultures, based on a review of several sources of usual practice and recommendations for similar species.

Method

I extracted ring internal diameters from lists obtained from six sources (see source list). Where more than one size was given in a list, I took the largest value. I wished to relate listed ring diameter to body weight to allow ring sizes to be interpolated for South Asian species with no listed ring size. I therefore extracted the upper bound of the range of body weights for each species given in the Handbook of the Birds of the World. The rationale for using maxima of ring diameter and body weight is that injury caused by using the wrong ring size occurs most frequently when the ring is too small and constricts the leg. Rings can also cause injury if they are too large and slip over the foot. However, I judge that error in this direction is unlikely to be frequent for vultures, especially because their sexual dimorphism in size is small.

Results

Data from ring size lists and maximum body weights are shown in Table 1. Ring diameter is plotted against maximum body weight in Figure 1.

Conclusion

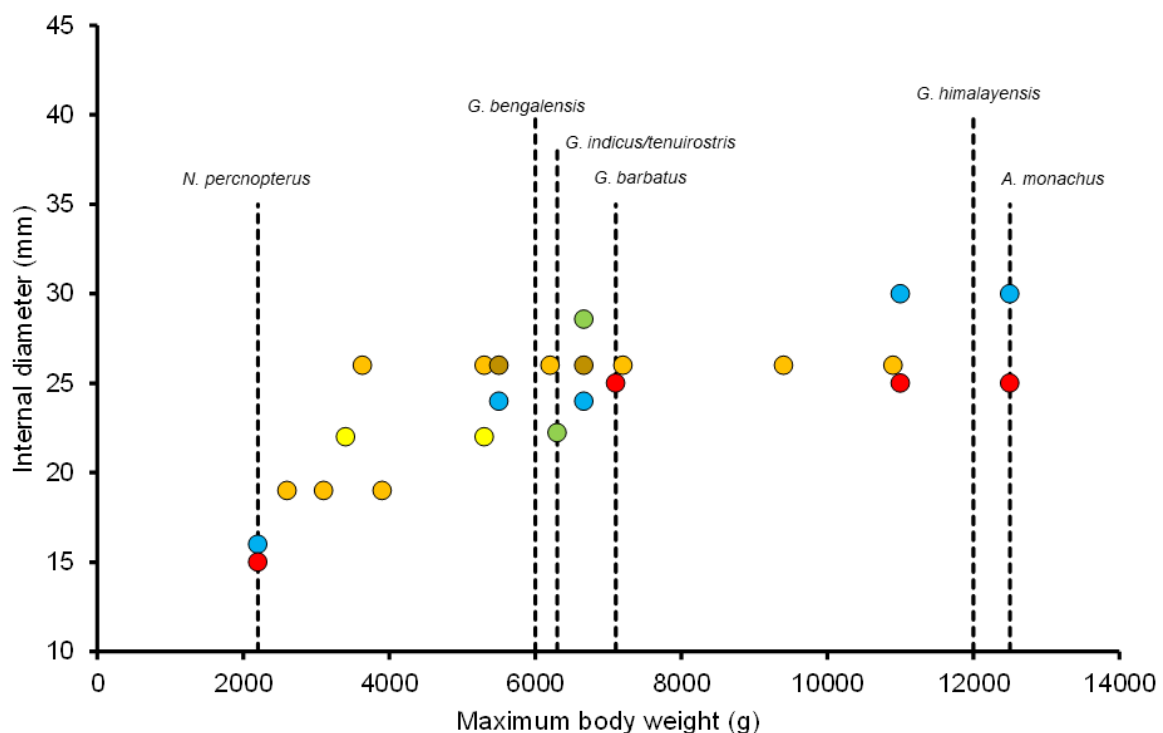
Based upon Table 1 and Figure 1, I have suggested ring diameters suitable for South Asian vultures in Table 2. It is important to understand that the data used in this review are from sources which give recommendations for good practice. My suggestions are not based upon studies which compare injury rates caused by rings for birds marked with rings of different diameters. I do not think that such studies have been done for these species. However, the ringing schemes from which data were obtained have been operating for considerable periods, so it seems likely that there will be low injury rates if these suggestions are followed. The use of leg rings is not recommended for New World vultures and condors, but rings have been widely used for Old World vultures and problems have been reported rarely.
